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State Assembly Declares March Grand Jury Awareness Month

March was declared "Grand Jury Awareness Month" by the state assembly in Sacramento on March 10, 2016. Sutter County Grand Jury Foreperson Steve Meyer, former CGJA Director and CGJA Sutter County Chapter President Beckie Jennings, and CGJA Vice-president Lloyd Bell were on the floor of the assembly as the concurrent resolution was read. Other Sutter residents were also present in the gallery to observe the occasion.

The sponsor of the resolution, Assemblyman James Gallagher from the 3rd District, has been a friend of the Sutter County Grand Jury since his time as a county supervisor. He committed to sponsoring the resolution at the request of Beckie Jennings. Assemblyman Gallagher is now taking steps to have the same resolution read in the state senate.

We at CGJA are grateful to Assemblyman Gallagher for his ongoing support of California's grand jury system.

Text of the Resolution:

Whereas, California's grand jury system is a unique component of our state's government. Present in each of our fifty-eight counties, these juries consist of citizens recommended by the

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Superior Court; and

Whereas, Our grand juries exist through the dedication of the people, and they help to ensure that the accused are treated fairly and that our local governments are maintaining the highest legal standards; and

Whereas, Grand juries are used at the beginning of the legal investigation process, these juries have three important functions: to decide whether a criminal act occurred and if there is enough evidence to charge a person with a crime, to use civil jurisdiction to oversee local governments and to reserve the power to accuse public officials of impropriety; and

Whereas, This gatekeeper role in our justice system ensures that citizens have a role in the justice process and that it operates effectively; and

Whereas, The hard work done by our grand juries has great impact throughout our communities, and they have helped to make California a better place; and

Whereas, These accomplishments can only be made through the outstanding dedication of those who volunteer to become grand jurors; and

Whereas, In recognition of those who volunteer to become grand jurors and to encourage all Californians to learn about this great part of the judiciary system and applaud those who have made it so successful. Therefore, be it

Resolved by the Assembly of the State of California, the Senate thereof concurring, That the Legislature of the State of California recognizes the month of March as Grand Jury Awareness Month; and be it further

Resolved, That the Legislature recognizes those who volunteer in a grand jury, encourages all Californians to learn about the great role of the grand jury in the judicial system, and applauds those who have made the grand jury so successful; and be it further

It is time to think about recommending someone you believe would be an excellent choice as a CGJA director. Every year we hold an election of one-half of our 12-member board, two from each region. Do you or another member you know have ideas about how the association should be run? If so, a seat on the board is the absolute best place to offer and promote those ideas.

You might want to consider running for election yourself. Or you might want to recommend another CGJA member as a candidate. In both cases, it is important that everyone involved understand the requirements of those who serve as directors. Therefore, we include elsewhere in this issue (page 7) the requirements to serve as a director for a two-year term. Based on the newly imposed term limits and retiring directors, we know there will be several vacancies. Therefore, this is an excellent opportunity for those interested, willing, and qualified to step forward and run for a position on the board. A healthy infusion of new people with fresh ideas is good for any organization like ours and we are no exception.

This is the first election since passing of the bylaw change that requires the election to be by region, meaning each member will vote only for two directors in their own region. We will provide explicit instruction to be sure that all members understand this change.

Nominations are now open and should be submitted to nominations@cgja.org.

Candidate statement submitted **June 10**

Ballot submitted to Board **June 23**

Membership closes for eligibility to vote **July 31**

Ballot mailed **August 30**

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Ballot returned **September 30**

Ballots counted and reported to Board and candidates **October 10**

Results announced in October Journal and at Annual Conference **October, November 5**

Calling For Best Grand Jury Report Nominations

Has your Grand Jury produced an outstanding report within the past five years? If so, nominate it for the CGJA's **Excellence in Reporting – Best Grand Jury report award**. Last year's winner was Santa Cruz for *Desalination and Alternatives: Water for a Thirsty County*. The previous year's winner was San Francisco County's report on the city's technology.

A single investigation or a series of directly related investigations done within the preceding five years are eligible (2010 -2015 -- thereby allowing sufficient time for responses). The award will be presented at the Annual Conference in November.

To justify the award, the report needs to compete with other nominations on the criteria shown below. The online submission process is easy once you have written an explanation and collected the documentation. See <http://cgja.org/eir>.

Report quality -- legible, documented, succinct, complete, and understandable

Citizen Impact: Importance or severity of problem

Duration/persistence of the problem

Difficulty of the investigation - many agencies, bureaucratic interference (e.g., denials, subpoenas), etc.

Substantiated findings and recommendations within the report

Exposure of the report by the media, or response from the public

Documented success of the investigation

The deadline for nominations in **June 30, 2016**. One nomination per county, please. Nominations may be made only by a CGJA Chapter or Association for its county. Where there is no Chapter or Association, nominations may be made by a CGJA member who resides in the county.

This nomination can be combined with that for the Best News Media coverage award – see the related article on the next page.

Celebrate Your Local Media's Support

Has a local media outlet been particularly supportive of the Grand Jury? If so, nominate it for CGJA's **News Media - Excellence in Reporting Award**. The media award nominee may be a media outlet (e.g., newspaper or web-based journal) or an individual reporter or reporting team.

Last year, the award went to *Lompoc Record* for its coverage of *A Failure of Oversight: Lompoc Housing and Community Development Corporation*, a report issued by the 2011-12 Santa Barbara County Grand Jury. The year before, *The Record* of Stockton won the award for reporting the failure of support for at-risk youth in San Joaquin county. In past years the *Appeal Democrat* (an online outlet), *Sacramento Bee*, *Oakland Local*, *San Francisco Chronicle*, *Mendocino Beacon/Fort Bragg Advocate News*, *Napa Valley Register*, *Tribune of San Luis Obispo*, and *Marin Independent Journal* have received awards for their support of the county Grand Jury.

Although you may not think of an outlet to nominate now, you may want to nominate media in the future. Be sure to keep a file of newspaper clippings along with print or electronic copies of online coverage of Grand Jury reports and activities (Internet descriptions disappear over time).

The nominating process is done easily online at <http://cgja.org/eir>. The main task is to describe and document how the media outlet or reporter met the following criteria:

- Increased familiarity with and understanding of the grand jury system
- Increasing public awareness of a specific grand jury investigation
- Improved public understanding of the issue investigated
- Community awareness of the outcome of a grand jury investigation

The deadline for nominations in **June 30, 2016**. One nomination per county, please. This nomination can be combined with that for best grand jury report – see the related article on previous page .

CGJA Chapter News from Around the State *News for You and by You*

Butte County Chapter *By Jerry Kunkle, President*

The Butte County chapter has been very active pursuing Implementation Review. Members have been actively reviewing grand jury recommendations and agency responses from about five years ago up to the 2013-2014 Grand Jury report. In selected cases, we have contacted the agencies that made commitments to changes recommended by those past grand juries, requesting an update. All inquiries were responded to promptly; and we were pleased to find that most agencies who had promised action have actually followed through, for the most part.

We found a few that had not followed up their commitment in their grand jury response; but in those cases, new commitments were made to comply with the response they made, with specific time lines. One agency actually missed two promised implementation dates promised to two grand juries on the same recommendation. They again made a promise to implement to our chapter with a timeline. We passed this information along to the current grand jury.

The Butte County chapter has also been actively making presentations to local social and service organizations. We are also working to generate contacts within the local school districts to offer our services in the area of broadening civic education in our secondary schools. We have been invited to make a brief presentation to new, potential grand jurors in May at the Butte County Courthouse. We have done this in prior years, and are working on other pathways in which we can provide even more services to the superior court, and improve our communications with the court.

Marin County Chapter *By Nadine Muller, President*

The Marin Chapter has been very active with outreach. We have had five open houses in various parts of our county, hoping to increase diversity. Our most recent success was a class taught at College of Marin (COM) by two of our chapter members. Here is a summary:

Susan Simpson and Rich Treadgold held the chapter's first-ever class at COM Continuing Education (Emeritus). Fourteen people had signed up; one dropped out the day before; and fifteen showed up for the class. Rich said, "Working with Susan was a dream - we had a fun time. There were lots of questions and interaction among the participants. Several indicated they would submit applications immediately, and the rest were very favorably inclined but wanted to discuss with their spouses. I believe this is a very time- and cost-effective way to reach out." Another class is set for April 9.

We have changed our Interviewing committee name to Selection Advisory Committee, since we will be providing recommendations to the superior court judge based on our new two-part interview process. We anticipate having four interview dates with about twenty-eight applicants on each day: The process will be as follows:

- 1) Seven applicants will meet with a facilitator as a group for a problem-solving activity of about fifteen minutes. Two observers will note their responses.
- 2) Each applicant will then be interviewed by two Marin Chapter members for approximately thirty minutes.

There will be four sessions per day starting at 12:00 noon and finishing at 4:00 p.m. At the end of each day, the interviewers and the observers will compare notes and write their recommendations.

Monterey Chapter *By Mac Small, President*

The CGJA Monterey County Chapter is ramping up its efforts to provide support to the Monterey County Superior Court in the areas of grand juror recruitment and improving public awareness of the grand jury system. With generous help from the Marin, Shasta, and San Francisco chapters, we are close to taking off our "training wheels."

Chapter representatives met in early February with the presiding judge for the Monterey County Superior Court and secured his approval for the chapter to move ahead on the following fronts:

- revising the court's recruiting brochure,
- recommending updates to the court's grand jury website,
- revising the court's juror applicant interview/evaluation form,
- establishing a program whereby both the court and the chapter jointly solicit juror applicants and inform the public about civil grand juries through public informational presentations,
- creating an integrated speech and powerpoint presentation for use at public events,
- participating in the interview and evaluation of grand jury applicants,
- preparing print media ads, and
- securing radio and TV appearances to promote grand jury service.

In mid-February, chapter representatives spoke to 96 members of the Pebble Beach Stillwater Club in an effort to inform this group of largely retired business leaders about the benefits of service on the civil grand jury. Mid-March saw the Monterey County Board of Supervisors issuing a proclamation declaring as March Civil Grand Jury Awareness Month. Chapter members and current civil grand jurors attended the ceremony.

CGJA Director Responsibilities Per the CGJA Bylaws, Article 6, Directors

Section 4. Duties

It shall be the duty of the Directors to:

- (a) Perform any and all duties imposed on them collectively or individually by law, or pursuant to these Bylaws.
- (b) Prescribe the duties and fix the compensation, if any, of all officers, agents and employees of the Corporation, except as otherwise provided in these Bylaws.
- (c) Supervise all officers, agents and employees of the Corporation to assure that their duties are performed properly.
- (d) Meet at such times and places as required by these Bylaws.
- (e) Register their address, including any electronic address (e.g. E-Mail or FAX), with the Secretary of the Corporation.
- (f) Approve the proposed annual ballot which includes a slate of qualified candidates for Director.
- (g) Elect officers of the Corporation.

Per the CGJA Policy Manual, §2.000, Board of Directors

2.013 Director Responsibilities:

- A. In addition to those duties outlined in the CGJA Bylaws, Directors shall attend all Board meetings except when excused by the President. Directors must be willing to participate in teleconference or face-to-face Board meetings at their own expense.
- B. Directors shall read and review all agenda packet items in preparation for each Board meeting.
- C. Directors shall attend the CGJA Annual Conference if possible, and shall do so at their own expense.
- D. Each Director shall be active on at least one of the CGJA's committees.
- E. Directors shall monitor and when necessary promptly respond to email and voicemail communications regarding the business of the Board and their committee(s).

Questions submitted recently by jurors:

Q. As foreperson, when I receive correspondence/letters/complaints I get a call from a clerk in the courthouse and I run down there to pick them up. They have always been opened, stamped that they have been received, and they are dated. These have all been mailed to the courthouse and clearly directed to/for the grand jury. I am concerned about confidentiality, so we have now opened a grand jury PO box. Am I correct to be concerned?

A. We believe that you are correct to be concerned about confidentiality and have made a wise decision to ensure that all correspondence to the grand jury that might be considered confidential (citizen complaints, evidence gathered as part of an investigation, etc.) be sent directly to the grand jury, to be opened by you or someone on your panel.

Q. Can the supermajority requirement be waived or changed at the end of the term if we do not have enough alternates to fill our panel? We are struggling to get enough jurors attending meetings to adopt our final reports.

A. Penal Code section 940, read in conjunction with section 916, provides for the number of jurors required to vote to approve final reports. For a jury originally consisting of 19 members, that number is 12, and for a jury originally consisting of 11 members, it is 8. We believe that the number of affirmative votes needed does not change if the jury falls below the originally appointed number of jurors.

The Superior Court has the authority to add members to a seated jury under Penal Code section 908.1, so we recommend that you ask your Presiding or Supervising Judge to impanel additional jurors to help you get through the remainder of your term with sufficient jurors to be able to approve your final reports.

Q. What is the process for conducting an exit interview at the end of an investigation and before the report is released, and how important is it to do so?

A. Penal Code section 933.05(d) allows the grand jury to “... request a subject person or entity to come before the grand jury for the purpose of reading and discussing the findings of the grand jury report that relates to that person or entity in order to verify the accuracy of the findings prior to their release.” We call this process the “exit interview.”

You will find our recommendations regarding how to conduct exit interviews in Attachment E, page 31 of Tab 5 in the CGJA Training Manual.

We believe that an exit interview is an extremely valuable tool for grand juries to use in their investigations. We recommend that you conduct an exit interview of the official in charge of the investigated entity or department as you are about to finish writing your report. This process enables you to verify that the findings are factually accurate. It also provides an added measure of fairness to your investigation by allowing the official the chance to dispute or clarify the findings or provide additional information. If the grand jury fails to conduct an exit interview, the official could criticize the jury and the report by saying, “The grand jury never even talked to me about this report.”

We also recommend that the exit interview be held early enough to allow time to verify information that might be provided by the interviewee, and to re-write part of the report if needed.

New Legislation proposed affecting release of grand jury reports *By Karen Jahr, President*

There is a new bill in the state Legislature related to grand juries, SB 1292, that we want our members and chapters, and the sitting grand juries, to be aware of.

SB 1292 is sponsored by the California Special Districts Association (CSDA) and was introduced on February 19 by Senator Jeff Stone (Riverside). This legislation would amend Penal Code section 933.05 with regard to exit interviews, the report-releasing process, and the distribution of entity comments to reports.

CGJA opposed the bill as introduced. Since then, we have worked closely with CSDA to develop compromise language, which is reflected in the March 28 amendment of the bill. We are satisfied that the new language meets our concerns. [Click here](#) for the text of the bill. (Or go to the State Legislature website and search for SB1292 under Bill Information.)

If enacted as currently amended, the bill would mandate exit interviews (they are now discretionary). It would allow the jury to discuss the facts as well as its findings with the exit interviewee; and with the court's permission, the jury could give the exit interviewee a copy of the draft findings and allow for written comments.

The bill would also require the grand jury to provide a copy of the final report to the official or entity six (rather than the current two) working days before its public release. During that time, the official or entity would be allowed to submit a preliminary response to the report; if it did so, the jury would be required to post the preliminary response on its website and reference the website in printed copies of the report. A governing board that wanted to submit comments or preliminary responses could prepare them in closed session during the six-day period, but the formal responses (the ones due within 90 days) would still need to be considered and approved in open session.

The bill will not take effect until July 2017, so it will have no impact on current juries.

The March 28 amendment of SB 1292 is a substantial improvement over the original version of the bill. CGJA believes that the bill as currently worded will lessen the chance of a report containing inaccurate or incomplete information because grand juries would always conduct exit interviews, during which the findings and, in the jury's discretion, the supporting facts, would be discussed with the subject of the investigation.

This bill has been assigned to the Senate Committee on Public Safety. We have met with the staff of the senators who are members of that committee. Larry Johnson, chair of our Legal and Legislative Resources Committee, will be speaking on our behalf at the committee hearing which is currently set for April 12.

We will continue to monitor SB 1292, communicate with legislators and committee staff, and attend committee and floor hearings as needed to protect the interests of the grand jury. We will keep you informed of developments.

We hope that our news blog especially benefits sitting grand juries. It is a resource to topics that grand juries investigate and how the media cover them. It may also benefit CGJA chapter implementation review efforts.

There are two ways that you can enhance your use of this news blog.

First, if you have a Facebook account, you will receive notifications of every news blog post if you check "f" (the Facebook icon) on the "Stay Connected" feature of our CGJA homepage. If you do not have a Facebook account, on the news blog page you can "subscribe to Posts," giving you a few options for instant notifications. Facebook is the easiest.

Second, you can search the posted media articles by key word(s): for example, by county, topic, or other descriptor. To do this, go to the CGJA home page and find "Search This Site." Type your words and hit Search.
